



Message From Mayor Lagergren

I can't believe that it is already October and school started over a month ago! Some of you may know that I work part-time with Gustavus Adolphus College supervising student teachers in elementary, middle school and high school classrooms. That means that I have been on the road quite a bit this fall and while driving, I noticed all the signs of fall around me --- farmers working in their fields, the beautiful fall colors appearing on trees, and the v-shaped flocks of geese already flying south. The sight of these geese reminded me of a story I heard many years ago. It still seems valuable today:





When geese fly in formation, they create their own unique form of teamwork. As each bird flaps its wings, it creates uplift for the bird immediately following. By flying in their 'V', the whole flock adds at least 71% more flying range than if each bird flew on its own. Geese honk from behind to encourage those up front to keep up their speed.

When a goose falls out of formation, it suddenly feels the drag and resistance of trying to go it alone and quickly gets back into formation to take advantage of the lifting power of the bird in front. When the lead goose gets tired, it rotates back in the 'V', and another goose flies point.

When a goose gets sick, or is wounded and falls out of formation, two other geese fall out with their companion and follow it down to lend help and protection. They stay with the fallen goose until it is able to fly, or until it dies, and only then do they launch out on their own, or with another formation to catch up with the group.

This story and the lesson we can learn reminds me of the amazing partnerships we have in our community. Through our partnership with the Central Schools, we continue to enlarge our community garden, have a renovated warming house at the hockey rink, have the potential for an indoor walking track, and have the opportunity to share the amazing local job opportunities at our upcoming Manufacturer's Day tours. Through our partnerships with local civic groups - the Lions Clubs, the American Legion and VFW - we have our amazing parks and the many opportunities we have to gather as a community. Through our partnership with the Chamber of Commerce we now have the NYA Marketplace and even more opportunities to gather as a community, especially during the upcoming Holiday season!

Together we have done amazing work! We support and stretch each other to greater heights! Our community continues to expand and grow - people are hearing about the welcoming atmosphere and the amazing amenities NYA has to offer and they want to be a part of our family. The message is out --- Norwood Young America, it's more than a place, its home!

Originally, 18 individuals applied for the position and these three finalists were chosen based on their experience and expertise. Mike Anderson currently serves as the Assistant to the City Manager for the City of Waseca, Minnesota, where he has been in the position for nearly five years. He has also held the position of Recreation Coordinator for the City of Oakdale, Minnesota, for five and a half years. Mr. Anderson holds a bachelor's degree in Recreation/Sport Management from St. Cloud State University and a master's degree in Urban and Regional Studies from Minnesota State University Mankato.


Andrea Aukrust is currently employed with the City of Hector, Minnesota, as the City Administrator. She has been serving in this role for over three years. Prior to this, she was a family business Co-Owner of Davis Rental Properties for 18 years, Coordinator of the Faribault, Martin, and Jackson Multi-Counties Adult Substance Abuse and Family Dependency Treatment Courts for nearly a year and a half, a Rehabilitative Services team member for the Sioux Trails Mental Health Center for approximately two and half years, and City Administrator/EDA Director for the City of Spicer, Minnesota, for one year. Ms. Aukrust holds a bachelor's degree in Sociology and Marketing and a master's degree in Urban Planning from Minnesota State University Mankato.

Jennifer Nash most recently worked for the City of Buffalo, Minnesota, as the Community & Economic Development Director where she had been in the role for 21 months. Prior to this, she served as their Planning & Development Coordinator for over four years. She has also served as the City Administrator/Economic Development Director for the City of Howard Lake, Minnesota, for one year, and as their Planning and Zoning Specialist/Deputy City Clerk for a year and a half. Ms. Nash has also been employed by the Sartell-St. Stephen School District as the Executive Assistant to the Superintendent for a year and a half, and as the Assistant to the City Administrator/Deputy City Clerk for the City of Northfield, Minnesota, for over four years. Ms. Nash holds a bachelor's degree in Public Administration from St. Cloud State University and a master's degree in Public Administration from Hamline University.

Change in Scenery

There will soon be a change to our skyline - the water tower on the southwest side of town will be coming down. This tower, which holds 300,000 gallons of water, was built in 1993 and was in use until 2008. At that time, a new tower holding 750,000 gallons of water was constructed near the Industrial Park and became the primary tower for the south side of town. The tower on the north side of town, which was recently repainted, holds an additional 200,000 gallons of water. The two city wells pull water from the Mt. Simon and Wonowoc Aquifer as well as a Quaternary Buried Artesian Aquifer, also referred to as a drift well, which does not pull from a specified aquifer. These aquifers are monitored by the Department of Natural Resources and the Department of Health.

Staff reviewed options for repairing this tower and putting it back into use in the future. The estimated cost for repair would be comparable to building a new tower. Leaving the tower standing and unused was also considered. The risk to neighboring homes and Ascension Church if the tower came down in a storm or because of rust was considered too great. Although we will miss this part of our skyline, the decision was made to remove the tower this fall at a cost of approximately \$20,000 plus removal of foundation.

Norwood Young America "Zoning 101" ______



What is the purpose of zoning?

Zones are used as a way of grouping areas with similar characteristics such as land use together and setting outcomes for the area through

Why is zoning within a city important?

The type, number, design and location of the subdivisions and commercial areas in a city do not just happen by chance. To the contrary, the location, character and look of a city is the result of conscious and deliberate actions, occurring over a number of years. There are numerous potential uses of land, including; farm land, open spaces, residential neighborhoods, apartments or condominiums, schools, parks, libraries, commercial areas, retail and restaurants, and industrial developments.

The use of all private and public land that lies within a city's boundaries is determined by its zoning laws. These laws extend from a cities obligation to "promote the health, safety, morals, convenience, order, prosperity and general welfare of the community." Perhaps, the best way to understand zoning is to consider a sketch of the floorplan of your house. In the same manner that a floorplan delineates each unique space or room of a home, a city's zoning laws divide the land in the city into separate areas or zones. Each area of the city is assigned a permitted use. The land within each of these areas must be developed consistent with its assigned use. As you would not choose to include a shower in your kitchen, a city's zoning laws would preclude the inclusion of an industrial development in an area reserved for residential use. Further, the placement of each room in a home is not random but rather the result of past experiences. Careful consideration is given to the primary purpose of each space, the family's needs and desires, as well as the practical, logistical implications of the placement. The same is true of a city. Zoning laws help to ensure that a community is laid out in the most convenient and efficient manner and that areas reserved for related and complimentary uses are located in close proximity. Similarly, the number of uses permitted within a city and the size and number of areas allocated for each permitted use of land are going to reflect the priorities and desires of the residents of that city.


Zoning is necessary to ensure a city is developed in the most convenient and efficient manner and that the character, identity, and composition of a city reflects the priorities. desires and preferences of its residents. Zoning is also instrumental in protecting property values, ensuring cohesive and orderly communities, promoting quality of live, and affording privacy and safety for residents. (reference tml1.org)

What is a zoning map?

A zoning map shows how the community is sectioned into different "use" districts or zones and are very specific in boundaries. Examples of zoning districts or zoning classifications include single-family residential, multi-unit residential, commercial, industrial and agriculture/transitional ag.

What does the NYA Zoning Map show?

The NYA Zoning Map tells a story. It shows that at one time there were two separate towns-Norwood and Young America. Both towns had their own downtowns (C-3









City/Commission Meetings can include City Council, Planning Commission, Economic Development Commission and Parks & Recreation Commission meetings. Weather Rules for Operation of Golf Carts/ATVs

City Code 750.08 Conditions of Operations: Operation of golf cars or Class 2 ATV on permitted streets within the City shall operate from sunrise to sunset between April 1 to November 1, except during periods of inclement weather or when visibility is impaired by weather, smoke, fog, or other conditions, or at any time when there is insufficient light to clearly see persons or vehicles on the roadway at a distance of 500 feet.

Parking During a Snowfall

Subd.1 Snowfall. "Snowfall" shall mean any accumulation of two or more inches of snow on a street when snow is falling or has fallen within the previous twenty-four hours.

Section 720.04 Restricted Parking During Snowfall and Blowing Snow. No person shall park or leave a motorized vehicle on any street within the City during or after a snowfall or a period of blowing snow until the snow has been removed from the street. Parking may be prohibited or restricted following snow removal as provided by City Code or State Law.

Designated Parking Areas

Effective November 1 to April 1, no parking is permitted on main streets in the downtown and business areas of town from 2:00am. Please watch for signs.

The City offers designated parking areas for those residents who do not have off-street parking during a snow emergency. Parking in the designated parking areas will be enforced from 2am-6am. The two designated parking spots within city limits are the north side of the Elm Street Municipal Parking Lot and the north side of Old City Hall/Food Shelf building. Watch for signs.

Cleaning Up Pet Litter

The owner of an animal shall be responsible for cleaning up any feces of the animal and disposing in a sanitary manner. This is on private and public property—this includes City parks, sidewalks and trails.
