The Council also approved the next step in purchasing land for an expansion of the current Industrial Park. Finally, the Council approved a Waiver of Municipal Consent which shows the community's support of the Highway 212 expansion. IYA Snow Announceme

Ticket & Towing

The City will be once again enforcing its ticketing and towing of vehicles that are in violation of parking on city streets during a snow event which is the accumulation of two (2) or more inches of falling or blowing snow. Vehicles parked on a city street during a snow event will be ticketed, and if not moved within four (4) hours, towed. All fines for tickets are to be paid with the Carver County Court Administrator's Office. Vehicles that are towed will be towed to Smith Oil and Food Mart in Norwood Young America. Prior to getting their vehicle back, the vehicle owner will be required to pay all towing fees, show proof of vehicle ownership, proof of vehicle insurance, and a valid driver's license. The vehicle will also need to have up-to-date license and registration.

Designated Parking Areas

New for this snow season are designated parking areas for residents who do not have off-street parking available. Parking in the designated parking areas will be enforced from 2am-6am. The parking restrictions follow our city street parking ordinance as stated above (Ticket & Towing). The two designated parking spots within city limits are the north side of the Elm Street Municipal Parking Lot and the north side of Old City Hall/ Food Shelf building. Watch for signs.

City Code "Parking"

Subd.1 Snowfall. "Snowfall" shall mean any accumulation of two or more inches of snow on a street when snow is falling or has fallen within the previous twenty-four hours.

Section 720.04 Restricted Parking During Snowfall and Blowing Snow. No person shall park or leave a motorized vehicle on any street within the City during or after a snowfall or a period of blowing snow until the snow has been removed from the street. Parking may be prohibited or restricted following snow removal as provided by City Code or State

City Code "Sidewalks"

800.04 Removal of Snow Required. The owner of any lot or parcel of land within the City shall, within twenty-four (24) hours after a snow fall or otherwise accumulate upon any sidewalk designated by a resolution of the city Council as a part of the sidewalk thoroughfare program in front of or adjoining such lot or parcel of land, remove or cause the snow to be removed from the sidewalk.

commissioner of the City to cause the snow to be removed from the sidewalk at the expense of the owner and the expense incurred in the removal thereof may be recovered against the owner in a civil action, or be assessed upon the lot or parcel of land from in front of which the snow shall be removed, and returned, collected and enforced as City taxes. **Cold Weather Driving Tips**

800.05 Removal of Snow by City; Assessment. In case the owner of any lot or parcel of land within the City shall fail to remove any snow that has fallen or otherwise accumulated upon any sidewalk as required by Subsection 800.04, it shall be the duty of the street

City Code "Mail Receptacles"

Subd. 1. Mailboxes in the Public Right-ofway. H. The City shall not be responsible or liable for any damages to mail receptacles not in compliance with this ordinance or damages to mail receptacles from snow thrown or moved as a result of snow plowing.

Subd. 1. Mailboxes in the Public Right-ofway. I. The City is not responsible for snow removal on or around the mail receptacles. It is the responsibility of each resident user of the mail receptacle to remove snow or other obstructions from around the mail receptacle

It's that time of year again and driving in snowy conditions can be a challenge! Please be prepared for cold weather driving:

- Keep at least half of a tank of gas in your car at all times.
- Talk to your mechanic to make sure your tires are property inflated and have a good tread.
- Do not leave your car unattended when it is warming up!
- Keep an emergency supply kit in your car—blankets, snacks, water, etc.
- Slow down:) Leave extra distance between you and the car in front of you.
