As 2022 comes to a close, we have much to celebrate as a community!



Our new city administrator, Andrea Aukrust, has completed her first full year with us! It's been slightly more than a year since Andrea joined our team and much has happened. Andrea has brought new insight, a positive spirit and a can-do attitude to our community. With her strong leadership, we have continued to grow and make the necessary improvements that will secure a positive future for our city.

The Historic Bandshell returned to its original home in Legion Park! This structure, built in 1900, served as a bandshell for concerts for 29 years before it was sold to a neighboring property owner and used as a garage for another 59 years. In 1988, it gained new life as a gazebo until it was donated to the Willkommen Preservation and Heritage Society in 2020. This summer it was returned to its original site and now proudly honors the important role music has played in our community's history.

Our community saw continued improvements with the installation of a new playground at NYA Legion Park and new paintings added to the Underpass! Legion Park was the site of much activity this year, including the installation of the Historic Bandshell plus an updated playground. Truth in Taxation Overview

On Monday, December 12th, the Council held their annual Truth in Taxation public hearing. This was an opportunity for city staff to share information on the City's budget process and to answer any questions about property taxes. Below you will find a summary of that discussion.

How does the City determine their budget for the year? Each fall, the City reviews the current year budget and determines wants and needs for the following year. There are four main components to our budget: General Fund, Capital Outlay/Equipment, Debt Service and Enterprise Funds. The General Fund covers most expenses of the city - including administration and staffing, public safety, streets, parks/trails, and building/grounds. This fund is financed by local property taxes (68%), state aid (19%) and miscellaneous fees (13%). The Capital Outlay/Equipment Fund primarily covers the purchase of large equipment and is funded entirely through property taxes. Debt Service covers the debt incurred in the past from street and building projects and is funded entirely through property taxes. Enterprise Funds include everything connected with sanitary sewer and water — including staffing, maintenance of treatment plants and infrastructure updates during street projects. This fund is financed by monthly utility fees and connection fees for new development.

The Property Tax Levy for the city went up 8%. What does that mean? In 2022, the city levied \$3,124,167 to meet anticipated expenditures. As the budget for 2023 was set, the city needed an additional \$250,715 (an increase of 8%) from local property taxes to balance the new budget. The additional \$250,715 will be shared by tax paying entities within the city limits - both residential and commercial - based on a property's taxable market value. The higher your taxable market value, the larger your portion of that amount will be. If you compare your city taxes from 2022 to 2023 and notice an increase greater than 8% based on a large increase in your taxable market value, some other entity within the city saw an increase less than 8% based on their taxable market value.

What will the additional 8% cover? The city will levy \$3,374,882 for the 2023 budget. It will cover the following areas: General Government expenses (including administration and staffing, public safety, streets, parks/trails, building/grounds) accounts for 55% of the property tax levy. Debt Service (including many past street and building projects) accounts for 19% of the property tax levy. Finally Capital Outlay and Equipment accounts for 26% of the property tax levy. Bigger projects planned for 2023 include a mill and overlay street project, the OldTown update (which has been levied in smaller amounts and saved over the past several years), additional monies toward sealcoating and crack sealing, railroad crossing repairs at Faxon and Reform and the purchase of land for the 2nd Industrial Park.

As a Council, we recognize that the 8% increase was larger than the past several years. Although we purposefully kept taxes low throughout the early years of the pandemic, this plan was not sustainable. With the current rate of inflation and cost of living, additional monies are needed to meet the future needs of the city. Thank you for your financial support — together we will continue to make the community better. Remember **Norwood Young America is more than a place, it's home** and our budget reflects our commitment to making it the best home possible.

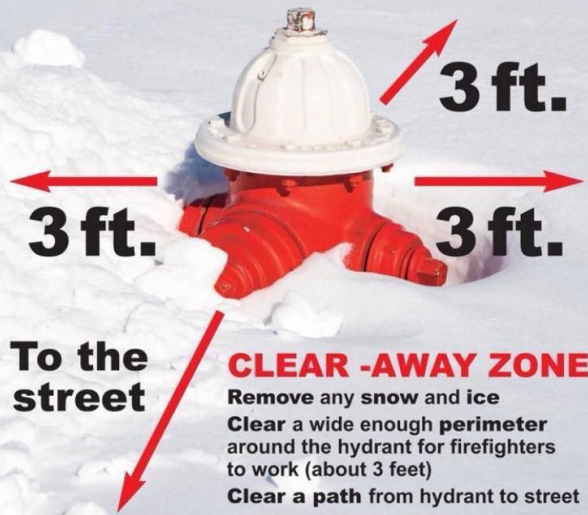

SNOW & ICE CONTROL POLICIES



Ticket & Towing

The City will once again be enforcing its ticketing and towing of vehicles that are in violation of parking on city streets during a snow event which is the accumulation of two (2) or more inches of falling or blowing snow. Vehicles parked on a city street during a snow event will be ticketed, and if not moved within four (4) hours, towed. All fines for tickets are to be paid with the Carver County Court Administrator's Office. Vehicles that are towed will be taken to Smith Oil and Food Mart in Norwood Young America. Prior to getting their vehicle back, the vehicle owner will be required to pay all towing fees, show proof of vehicle ownership, proof of vehicle insurance, and a valid driver's license. The vehicle will also need to have up-to-date license and registration.

Designated Parking Areas

There are designated parking areas for residents who do not have off-street parking available during snow emergencies. Parking in the designated parking areas will be enforced from 2am-6am. The parking restrictions follow our city street parking ordinance as stated above (Ticket & Towing). The two designated parking spots within city limits are the north side of the Elm Street Municipal Parking Lot and the north side of Old City Hall/Food Shelf building. Watch for signs.

Sump Pump Reminders

Sump pumps may not be discharged into the storm sewers between November 1st and April 1st. Doing so results in dangerous ice conditions on the City streets. Should you need to discharge your sump pump during this time, please do so on your own property, away from City streets, alleys and sidewalks.

Safe sidewalks and Clean Lakes

Wintertime brings a surge of chloride pollution into our lakes and rivers. When we use de-icing salt on our sidewalks, driveways, and roads, much of that salt ends up in bodies of water where it dissolves into chloride.

High chloride levels are toxic to fish, aquatic insects, and amphibians, and harms the aquatic ecosystem. It doesn't take much – just one teaspoon of salt contains enough chloride to permanently pollute five gallons of water! So far, the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency has identified 54 lakes and streams in Minnesota with chloride levels high enough to harm fish and other aquatic life, and 75 more water bodies are approaching unsafe levels.

Salt is also corrosive, damaging parking lots, walkways, bridges, and buildings. According to the Environmental Protection Agency, maintenance and repair of salt damage to roads, bridges, and automobiles in the U.S. costs around \$5 billion each year. In the landscape, chloride kills plants, trees, and lawns, and changes the soil chemistry so future plant growth is difficult. It can also harm our pets who may lick it off their paws or drink salty snowmelt.

Chloride is a permanent pollutant. Once in a lake or river, it's impossible to remove it safely and cost-effectively. The only way to reduce chloride levels in water is to use less salt.

Using the right practices keeps us safe from slips and falls and reduces negative impacts from salt. Follow these steps to prevent ice and use salt properly.

Shovel That Snow

The best way to prevent ice is to shovel. Shovel early and shovel often. Remove the snow and there is less there to get compacted and turn to ice, thus reducing the need for salt.

Watch Your Scatter

When applying salt, watch your scatter. Scatter the salt widely, leaving space between grains of salt. A coffee mug of salt is enough for 60-70 feet of sidewalk, or two parking spots. A hand or push spreader helps get the right distribution.

Watch the temperature

Rock salt (NaCl) is NOT useful when the temperatures are below 15°F. Even at 15°F it can take an hour to melt ice. Shovel and use a little sand for traction if needed during cold temperatures.

Sweep Up Leftovers

Salt only works once it is dissolved. If you can see salt on your driveway hours after it has been applied, it isn't doing any work. Sweep it up and use it again next time. Otherwise, it will just blow away or wash into storm drains with the next melt.

PLEDGE TO BE SALT SMART



1. Shovel

Clear walkways before snow turns to ice. Apply salt only if needed.



2. Select

Salt doesn't melt ice below 15°F. Use sand for traction when it's too cold, or a different de-icer.



3. Scatter

Use salt only where critical. Aim for 3 inches of space between salt granules.



4. Sweep

Clean up leftover salt, sand, and de-icer to save and reuse as needed.

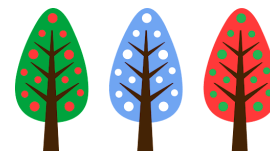

Unfortunately, it is also the time of year for bad people to take advantage of good people. Please use these simple tips as a friendly reminder when approached with situations that "just doesn't seem right."

- If you are taking a vacation over the winter or are lucky enough to be a "snowbird," try to remember to have your mail forwarded or halted until you get back, arrange for someone to shovel your driveway/walkway to make it look like someone is home, and put timers on lights to insinuate you are home. You are also welcome to call the Carver County Non-Emergency line at 952-361-1231 to request extra patrol in your neighborhood while you are gone.
- The IRS will NEVER call you for personal information. Do not give out any personal information about your address, birthday, social security number, banking, credit card info to anyone!
- If you receive a phone call from someone who says "Your grandchild is in jail and needs help" - it is NOT true. Make sure to never say your grandchild's name during this conversation—the scammer will use this personal information to further the conversation! Never give them bank account information or credit card numbers.
